## NOTE FROM PASTOR DANIEL



Making deeply committed disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world, one life at a time.

On Friday January 3, I got up and prepared to finish my drive home from the Sugar Bowl. As I began to load the car, my phone buzzed. I had a new news alert from Apple News. Normally these alerts don't move me to action, but this one did. Rather than alerting me to the newest piece of drama from Washington DC, this alert told me that my beloved United Methodist Church had split. I knew in my head that it logistically couldn't be true, but it was still a strong kick in the gut.

I don't know how you first encountered the news, but I know it prompted strong feelings in many. In the days that have followed I have received a number of questions, and concerned comments, so I want to take a moment to tell you what we know, where you can go for more information (see resource list at the end of this article), and what our call remains.

#### The United Methodist Church is not of one mind.

As we discussed in advance of the special Called General Conference of 2019, the United Methodist Church is a diverse global church in which there is theological disagreement regarding the full inclusion of the LGBTQ+ community into the life of the church. This is a conversation that the UMC has been having since 1972. It is one that has dominated much of the time and energy of the last several General Conferences. Specifically, our place of theological disagreement lies in our understandings of human sexuality related to marriage and ordination.

<u>Please Note:</u> This global conversation is NOT about FUMC Cleburne's commitment to love, include, worship with, minister with, serve and be in community with LGBTQ+ persons. <u>ALL</u> are welcome, wanted and loved in the Body of Christ, and especially in The United Methodist Church.

#### The denomination did NOT split on January 3 as a number of headlines read.

On January 3, a group of leaders from within all of the major caucus groups within the church worked together with the help of a mediator to come to produce the "Protocol of Reconciliation & Grace Through Separation" agreement. While many of the media headlines about the "Protocol of Reconciliation & Grace Through Separation" agreement indicated that the United Methodist Church had agreed to split, this is simply not the case. Only General Conference can make such decisions for the denomination and General Conference will not meet again until this May 5-15 in Minneapolis, Minn.


